

Ted Bjornn Idaho Chapter of the American Fisheries Society Scholarship

The Idaho Chapter of the American Fisheries Society (ICAFS) annually sponsors two University of Idaho scholarships to support full time undergraduate and graduate students working toward a degree in aquatic resources or fisheries. The objectives of the society are to:

- a. Promote the conservation, development and wise use of the fisheries;
- b. Promote and evaluate the development and advancement of all branches of fisheries science and practice;
- c. Gather and disseminate to society members and the general public scientific, technical and other information about fisheries science and practice through publications, meetings, and other forms of communication;
- d. Encourage the teaching of fisheries science and practice in colleges and universities and the continuing professional development of fisheries workers.

With these objectives in mind, the Ted Bjornn ICAFS has established an annual scholarship of \$500 to support an undergraduate student and one of \$500 to support a graduate student working towards a degree in fisheries or aquatic sciences at the University of Idaho. Selection will be made on the basis of academic promise and potential contribution to the profession.

Application Process:

- 1 A one to two page curriculum vitae or resume, listing experience and pertinent education up to this point;
- 2 A written statement of how you see yourself working and contributing in the profession to advance the goals of the American Fisheries Society;
 - a. A written statement of why you want this scholarship; and
3. A letter of support from your faculty advisor which includes your current academic standing in a degree program.
